HIV drugs may help fight against deadly fungal infection, Seleem lab study finds

Antiviral drugs can make antifungals work again. That, at its simplest, is the approach Mohamed Seleem's lab at the Center for One Health Research has found may be a key treatment strategy in the battle against Candida auris, a frighteningly deadly fungal pathogen discovered in 2009 that is considered an urgent threat by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
